ABOUT DEW AND LMI

The Labor Market Information Division compiles and publishes employment statistics, job forecasts, wage data, demographics, and other labor market information to help public and private organizations, researchers, and others better understand today's complex workforce.

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The state's population continued to grow from 2018 to 2022. The percentage of the population graduating high school or higher increased from 88.4 percent in 2018 to 90.5 percent in 2022. Those obtaining at least a bachelor's degree increased from 28.3 percent to 32.6 percent over the 5-year period. The veterans' share of the population fell from 9.2 percent in 2018 to 8.4 percent in 2022. The disabled population as a proportion of the total civilian noninstitutional population remained fairly steady over the period on a percentage basis.

The female population in South Carolina is slightly higher than the male population, with females making up 51.4 percent and males comprising 48.6 percent. The median age range in the state is 40.5 years old. White residents make up 63.6 percent, or 3.3 million. The smallest population is the Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander racial group, consisting of just over 2,300 people.

In 2023, the labor force totaled 2.475 million people out of a civilian noninstitutional population of 4.275 million, resulting in a labor force participation rate (LFPR) of 57.9 percent. In terms of educational attainment, over 65 percent of those holding a bachelor's degree or higher were employed, while 58.5 percent of those with some college or an associate degree were employed. Both of those populations had unemployment rates below 2.0 percent.

South Carolina's labor market has improved over the past several years with the labor force and employment levels reaching all-time highs in 2023. The unemployment rate peaked at 11.7 percent in April 2020 and declined to 3.0 percent by the end of 2023.

South Carolina had more than 177,000 business establishments in 2023, with 2.243 million jobs held, paying an average weekly wage of \$1,113. The Management of Companies and Enterprises industry grew the most in average weekly wages from the previous year at 14.5 percent, while the Professional and Technical Services industry grew the most in average employment at 7.3 percent. For industry projections, the Management of Companies and Enterprises Industry is projected to have the fastest growth in jobs from 2022 to 2032 at 39.1 percent. Transportation and Warehousing follows with a projected growth of 28.9 percent, and Health Care and Social Assistance rounds out the top three industries at 17.4 percent.

South Carolina had more than 2.222 million wage and salary occupational jobs in 2023 with an average hourly wage of \$26.08. Office and Administrative Support occupations had the highest number of jobs with 285,910, followed by Sales and Related occupations with 226,140. For occupation projections, Computer and Mathematical occupations are projected to have the fastest growth in jobs from 2022 to 2032 at 23.9 percent, closely followed by Healthcare Support occupations at 23.7 percent.

In terms of jobs openings by major occupation group, more than 300,000 annual average job openings are projected from 2022-2032 for the state. Food Preparation and Serving Related occupations are projected to have the most annual openings at 45,968, followed by Office and Administrative Support occupations and Sales and Related occupations both with slightly more than 35,000.

A tool workforce professionals use to help them understand the labor market is the supply-demand gap analysis. The "supply gap," is the difference between the number of adjusted postsecondary graduates qualified for a given occupation and the number of job openings within the occupation in 2023. The annual supply gap across all occupations in South Carolina is about 27,000 workers. The supply gap for occupations that typically require a bachelor's degree as a minimum requirement accounts for about half (13,602) of the total supply gap statewide. The Coordinating Council for Workforce Development has identified 168 priority occupations that are important and will be emphasized in the South Carolina economy.

South Carolina's Gross Domestic Product (GDP) was \$322.3 billion in 2023. The growth rate from the previous year, in real inflation-adjusted dollars, was 3.6 percent. The top industry in value in 2023 was Finance, Insurance, Real Estate, Rental, and Leasing. The Arts, Entertainment, and Recreation industry grew the most in percentage terms from 2022 to 2023, followed by the Retail Trade industry.

The state's total exports in 2023 valued \$37.3 billion dollars, or 11 percent of the state's GDP, for the year. Transportation Equipment, the top export commodity, represented 52.1 percent of the total export value, followed by Chemicals at 11.1 percent and Plastics and Rubber Products at 7.7 percent. Germany, Canada, and China were the state's top three export partners.

The state workforce development board's designated priority populations face challenges to employment that workforce officials can help overcome. Those populations include juvenile offenders, ex-offenders, homeless, veterans, and others.

South Carolina is divided into 12 Workforce Development Areas or WDAs: Catawba, Greenville, Lowcountry, Lower Savannah, Midlands, Pee Dee, Santee-Lynches, Trident, Upper Savannah, Upstate, Waccamaw, and Worklink. An examination of occupational employment and wages, industry statistics, and annual job openings for each WDA is included. In general, the urban areas employ more people, have more job openings and pay a higher average wage than the rural areas.

INTRODUCTION

South Carolina's economy has seen robust growth coming out of the worldwide pandemic. Recent economic development successes bode well for the state to continue this upward trajectory. The South Carolina Department of Commerce had its second highest announced capital investment of \$9.22 billion in 2023, which represents 14,120 announced jobs. This result follows on from 2022's record-setting investments. Encouragingly, two of the investments over \$1 billion were in the newer technology sectors of electric vehicles/batteries and alternative energy/fuels.¹

The purpose of the South Carolina Economic Analysis Report is to present an overview of key metrics used in examining South Carolina's economy and workforce. The Labor Market Information Division of DEW compiles and publishes numerous data series on the state of the workforce. These measures and other pertinent data sources were utilized in this examination.

This report highlights numerous measures illuminating the state's economy. South Carolina's population trends start the report, including results from the 2022 American Community Survey. Geographic Profiles from the Bureau of Labor Statistics Current Population Survey will follow. Labor force trends and unemployment rate trends will also be analyzed.

Statewide current industrial employment and wages with industry projections, occupational employment and wages with occupational projections, and job openings by major occupation group are included. A brief summation of our department's labor market supply-demand gap analysis forms the next section, followed by a look at priority occupations in the state. South Carolina's gross domestic product data will be discussed, in addition to information on foreign trade.

An examination of our state's priority populations follows the prior sections, and, to close out the report, an in-depth analysis of the workforce conditions in each of the 12 workforce development areas is provided, to include information on occupation and wage data, industry spotlight reports from JobsEQ, a third-party data vendor, and an analysis on job openings based on our agency's occupational projections data.

SOUTH CAROLINA'S POPULATION TRENDS

Certain population characteristics are important in terms of economic and workforce issues. Among those characteristics are educational attainment, veteran and disability status, and geographic mobility. A more educated workforce attracts industries into the state. Veterans offer work skills that are appealing to potential employers. The disabled workforce may require special conditions for employment. A mobile population can take advantage of their workforce skills in regions best suited for them.



Exhibit 1 displays such information for the state over the five-year period of 2018-2022. Over time, lower percentages of the population aged 25 and older report an education of less than a high school diploma, and higher percentages report obtaining more than a high school education. In 2022, 90.5 percent of the population aged 25 and older had a high school education and 32.6 percent held a bachelor's degree or higher. The increasingly educated population bodes well for the state economically.

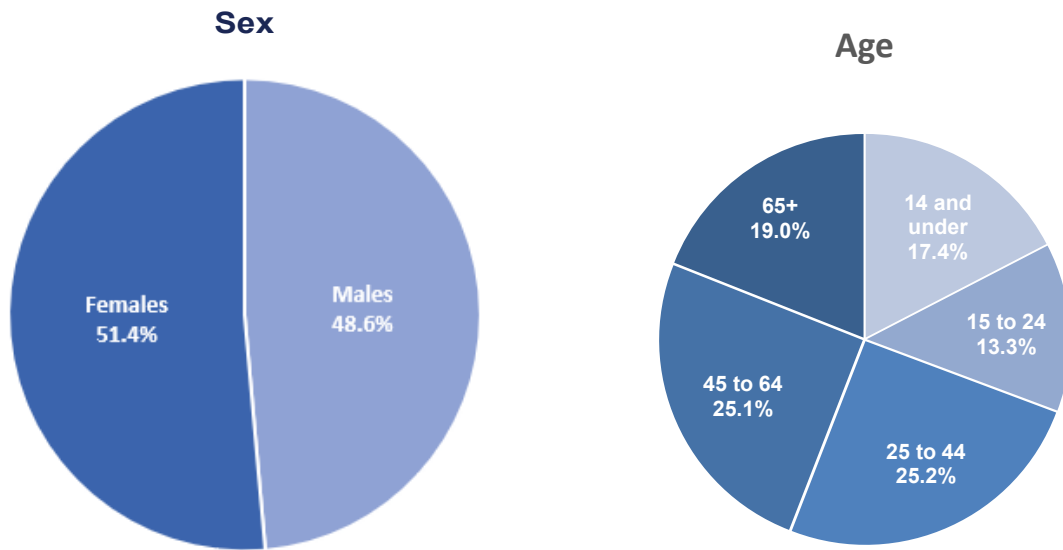
The proportion of veterans in the population aged 18 or higher decreased almost a full percentage point from 9.2 percent in 2018 to 8.4 percent in 2022. The percentage of South Carolinians with a disability among the noninstitutional population ticked up slightly over the period to 14.5 percent in 2022, as did the proportion aged 18-64, rising to 12.3 percent in 2022. The percentage of residents staying in the same home has fluctuated over the past five years, settling at 86.5 percent in 2022.

Over the recent past, South Carolina's civilian population aged 18 and above has seen a notable increase, growing nearly 175,000 people from 2018 to 2022. The sex and age demographics for the state are highlighted in the next section.

American Community Survey Results

South Carolina continues to be a changing state in terms of population demographics. As seen in **Exhibit 2** below, females make up 51.4 percent of the total population, and males make up 48.6 percent. A little more than half the state is composed of people aged between 25 and 64 years old, with the median age being 40.5 years old.

Exhibit 3 depicts the racial demographics within the state. The White population makes up most of the state population, at 63.6 percent, or about 3.4 million residents, while the Black or African American population makes up 25 percent, or about 1.3 million residents. The smallest population is the Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islanders, consisting of a little more than 2,300 people out of the nearly 5.3 million total population.

Geographic Profiles

From the Bureau of Labor Statistics Current Population Survey results for 2023, the labor force in South Carolina totaled 2.475 million individuals out of a civilian noninstitutional population of 4.275 million, resulting in a labor force participation rate (LFPR) of 57.9 percent. The following table in **Exhibit 4** presents the employment status of various subpopulations within the state for the same year.

Note: Data for demographic groups are not shown when the labor force base does not meet the BLS publication standard of reliability for the area in question, as determined by the sample size. Detailed items may not sum to totals because of rounding. Estimates for the race groups shown in the table (White, Black, and Asian) do not sum to totals because data are not presented for all races. In addition, people whose ethnicity is identified as Hispanic or Latino may be of any race and, therefore, are classified by ethnicity as well as by race. When examining sex specific LFPRs, men displayed a rate of 62.4 percent, while the women's rate stood at 53.8 percent. Additionally, the unemployment rate for men was 3.1 percent, while women experienced a slightly higher rate of 3.2 percent. Regarding racial demographics, both White and Black populations showed similar LFPRs at 57.1 percent and 59.5 percent, respectively. In contrast, Hispanics or Latinos had a much higher LFPR of 68.0 percent in 2023.

The level of educational attainment within the workforce plays a vital role in South Carolina’s expanding economy. As indicated in **Exhibit 5**, the civilian noninstitutional population aged 25 and older had the largest representation of individuals with a bachelor’s degree or higher, accounting for 1.286 million people, equivalent to 35.3 percent of the population with nearly 66.0 percent employed.

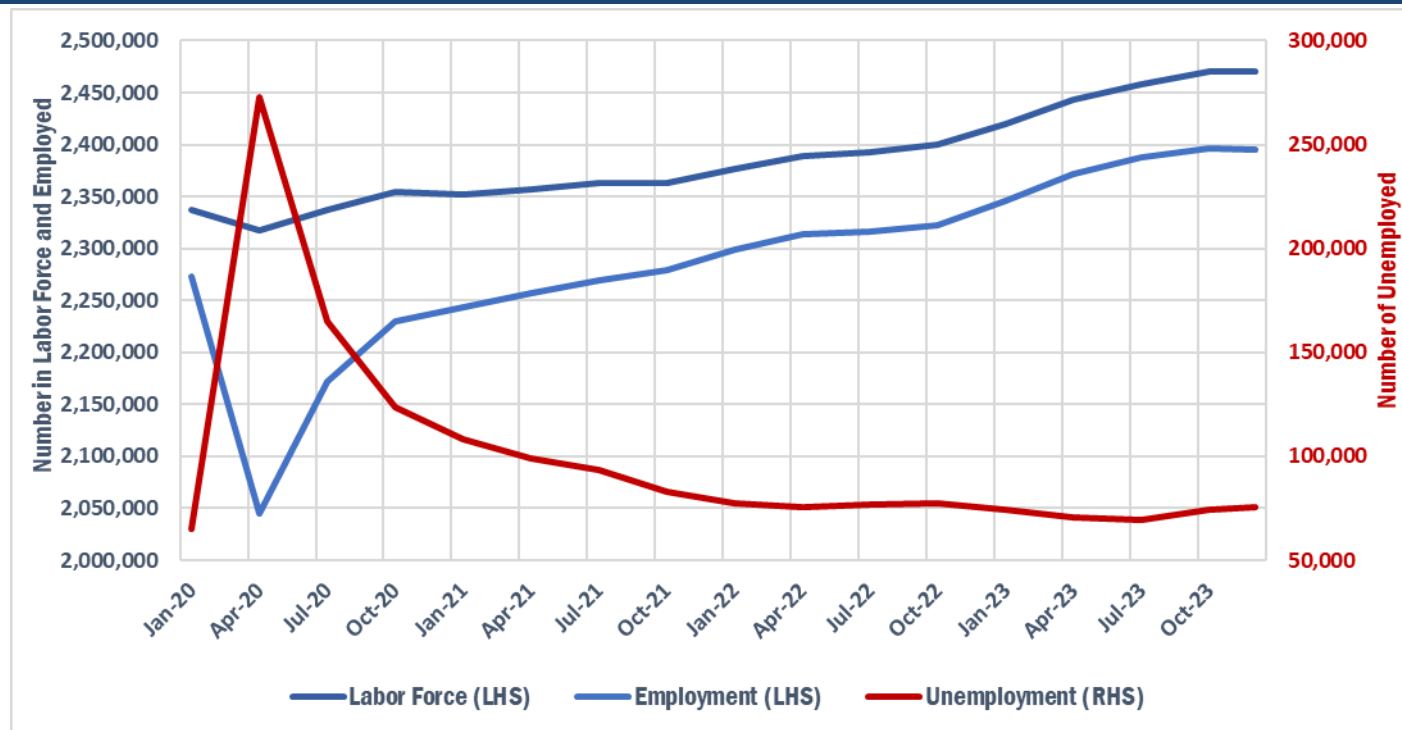
Furthermore, the data in the table reveals a positive correlation between educational attainment and LFPR. Individuals with less than a high school diploma exhibited an LFPR of 37.7 percent, while those with a bachelor’s degree or higher had a significantly higher LFPR at 67.0 percent. This information underscores that postsecondary education results in higher rates of labor force participation compared to the state’s overall average.

LABOR FORCE TRENDS

An important component of the economy in South Carolina is the labor force. The Bureau of Labor Statistics' monthly household survey estimates labor force for individuals at their residence location and equals the sum of the employed and the unemployed. **Exhibit 6** illustrates the trends of the labor force (left-hand scale), employed (left-hand scale), and unemployed (right-hand scale) from 2020 to 2023.

Over the period 2020-2023, the overall labor force has grown by 132,750 people.

EXHIBIT 6: SOUTH CAROLINA LABOR FORCE, 2020-2023



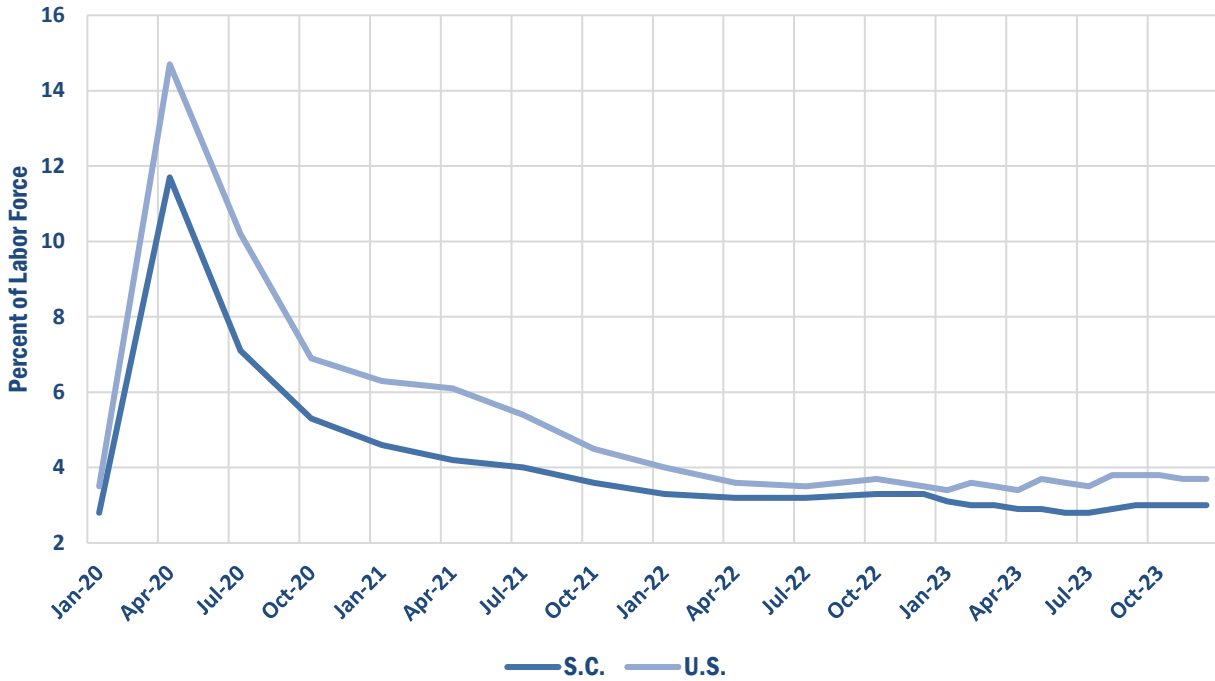

Employment rose by 122,869 people during the time period of January 2020 to December 2023, which came to a total employed of 2.39 million. Unemployment increased from 64,992 to 74,873. The peak unemployment during the period was 272,540 people in April 2020, with the low being 64,992 in January 2020.

Unemployment Rate Trends

The unemployment rate is the percentage of the labor force that is unemployed. In January 2020, the rate stood at 2.8 percent and by the end of 2023, the rate had fallen to 3.0 percent from the pandemic high. During this four-year period, the high was reached in April 2020 with an 11.7 percent unemployment rate in South Carolina, compared to a 14.7 percent rate nationally. **Exhibit 7** highlights the trends of the unemployment rates over the recent four-year period.

SOUTH CAROLINA INDUSTRY EMPLOYMENT AND WAGES

South Carolina had more than 2.243 million wage and salary jobs in 2023, over 177,000 business establishments, and an average weekly wage of \$1,113. **Exhibit 8** displays the employment and wages for the state's industry sectors and the percent growth from 2022.

Health Care and Social Assistance had the highest employment with just over 300,000 jobs, followed by Retail Trade with almost 266,000 jobs, and Manufacturing with just over 263,000. Of the approximate 177,000 business establishments in the state, more than 30,000 were engaged in the Professional and Technical Services industry, almost 20,000 were in Retail Trade, and over 16,000 were in Health Care and Social Assistance. The highest weekly wages were found in the Management of Companies and Enterprises sector at \$1,961, followed by Utilities at \$1,893, and Professional and Technical Services at \$1,772. Accommodations and Food Services had the lowest average weekly wages at \$474, followed by Arts, Entertainment, and Recreation at \$528.

In terms of percent change from last year, the state's average employment increased by 2.3 percent. Professional and Technical Services employment grew the fastest at 7.3 percent, followed by Other Services (except Public Administration) at 6.0 percent, and Educational Services at 5.7 percent. Administrative and Waste Management grew the fastest among establishments at 16.4 percent, with no industries having a decline in the number of establishments. Average weekly wages overall grew by 3.2 percent over the past year. Management of Companies and Enterprises increased the fastest at 14.5 percent, followed by Finance and Insurance with a growth of 9.6 percent, and Mining, Quarrying, and Oil/Gas Extraction at 8.0 percent. Health Care and Social Assistance had a decline in wage growth at -3.5 percent, as did Accommodation and Food Services at -1.5 percent, and Transportation and Warehousing at -0.4 percent.

Industry Projections

Exhibit 9 presents the latest available industry employment projections from 2022 to 2032 for South Carolina and highlights them by major industry group. Management of Companies and Enterprises is expected to increase the fastest at 39.1 percent, followed by Transportation and Warehousing at 28.9 percent, and Health Care and Social Assistance at 17.4 percent. Only one industry is projected to have negative growth over the decade—Agriculture, Forestry, Fishing and Hunting at -2.1 percent.

SOUTH CAROLINA OCCUPATIONAL EMPLOYMENT AND WAGES

South Carolina had 2.223 million wage and salary occupational jobs in 2023 with an hourly mean wage of \$26.08. **Exhibit 10** summarizes more than 800 detailed occupations into major occupational groups and presents employment and median and average wage information.

The Office and Administrative Support Occupations category had the highest employment with 285,910 jobs, followed by Sales and Related Occupations with 226,140, and Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations with 222,670 employees. The highest average hourly wages were found in Management Occupations at \$55.89 per hour, Computer and Mathematical Occupations at \$44.86 per hour, and Healthcare Practitioners and Technical Occupations at \$44.06 per hour. Food Preparation and Serving-Related Occupations had the lowest average wages at \$13.45 per hour.

Occupation Projections

Exhibit 11 highlights the state employment projections by major occupation groups. Office and Administrative Support Occupations are projected to have the highest number of jobs in 2032 with 315,503, followed by Sales and Related Occupations with 262,526, and Transportation and Material Moving Occupations with 248,351. Overall, the state is expected to have 2.614 million jobs in 2032.

JOB OPENINGS BY MAJOR OCCUPATION GROUP

Exhibit 12 lists the major occupation groups sorted by annual job openings in the state. Total openings are composed of workers having exits from the labor force, transfers to other occupations, or the overall growth in the occupation over time. These circumstances create opportunities for job seekers to fill open positions. Overall, South Carolina is projected to have 304,271 annual job openings in all occupations. Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations is expected to have the most openings at 45,968 per year over the 10-year period, followed by Office and Administrative Support Occupations at 36,365, and Sales and Related Occupations at 35,223.

LABOR MARKET SUPPLY-DEMAND GAP

A tool workforce professionals use to help them understand the labor market is the supply-demand gap analysis. The “supply gap,” is the difference between the number of adjusted postsecondary graduates qualified for a given occupation and the number of job openings within the occupation. In 2023, graduate numbers in each program were adjusted based on factors such as the percentage expected to remain in South Carolina post-graduation. In addition to the supply gap in 2023, this analysis also contains information about projected 10-year growth of occupations, median wages, and the demand supply ratio: the number of job openings in an occupation divided by the number of qualified postsecondary graduates. While the supply gap indicates the overall need for an occupation in the state, the demand supply ratio shows how the output of pertinent postsecondary credentials compares to the projected future needs of the job market. Together, this information provides a snapshot of some of the opportunities and challenges the state will face in meeting the labor pool requirements of businesses in the coming years.



The annual supply gap across all occupations in South Carolina is about 27,000 workers. The supply gap for occupations that typically require a bachelor’s degree as a minimum requirement accounts for about half (13,602) of the total supply gap statewide. Approximately 17 percent (4,694) of the supply gap is for occupations that typically require an associate degree as a minimum requirement, while another 17 percent (4,455) represents occupations requiring a minimum of a master’s degree. Occupations that typically require a doctoral or professional degree make up 9 percent (2,435) of the supply gap, and the final 6 percent (1,731) of the supply gap represents occupations typically requiring only a post-secondary certification to meet minimum education requirements. While occupations requiring a doctoral or professional degree make up only 9 percent of the supply gap, occupations requiring this level of education have the highest demand supply ratio (3.12—meaning there is approximately one qualified graduate for every three openings).

At the career cluster level, the largest supply gaps are Health Science (6,539), Education and Training (3,654), and Business Management and Administration (2,918). The Transportation, Distribution, and Logistics cluster has a demand supply ratio more than double any other cluster, 8.95, based on only 201 graduates for 1,798 openings. The next highest demand supply ratio among clusters is for Finance, which has a ratio of 3.82 based on 880 graduates for 3,360 openings. The clusters with the smallest supply gaps (all below 300) are Agriculture, Food, and Natural Resources; Government and Public Administration; and Arts, Audio/Video Technology, and Communications.

At the occupation level, the largest supply gaps across all occupations typically requiring a post-secondary credential are:

Among these occupations, the largest demand supply ratios are found in Paralegals and Legal Assistants (8.14—87 graduates for 708 openings), Human Resources Specialists (7.60—146 graduates for 1,110 openings), and Automotive Service Technicians and Mechanics (5.82—116 graduates for 675 openings). However, while Software Developers has a demand supply ratio of 3.53 (419 graduates for 1,480 openings), lower than some of the other occupations with large supply gaps, the number of job openings for that occupation in the state (currently 12,106) is projected to grow in ten years by nearly 70 percent (8,430 openings). Looking to the future, computer science related occupations are just one category with growth pointing to even wider future shortages in graduates. Other occupations with growth that could exacerbate shortages include industrial engineers, data scientists, automotive service technicians and mechanics, heating and air mechanics and installers, logisticians, and several medical occupations.

Although this analysis is only one analytical perspective on the state's workforce, the data yield insights into investment targets for the alignment of education with employer demand at the post-secondary level. Data-driven collaboration among policymakers, educators, employers, and other stakeholders to meet present and future demand will ensure the state's workforce remains responsive to evolving industry needs, advances in technology, and continued growth.

PRIORITY OCCUPATIONS

The South Carolina Coordinating Council for Workforce Development (CCWD) has developed a set of priority occupations that meets the workforce demands of industry and can overcome barriers to participation in the workforce. These occupations have high demand, high growth, sustainable wages, and high retention. These are positions that are important to the economic productivity of South Carolina's economy.

The goal in each of the 168 occupational selections is to ensure jobs across numerous industries and wages at a level necessary to enable self-sufficiency for the average size family in South Carolina. Prioritizing high demand and high growth jobs helps meet current and future needs of industries. Simultaneously, jobs that have livable wages and high retention provides stability for the state's families.

Exhibit 13 below summarizes the count of priority occupations by educational career cluster.

The table shows that the Architecture & Construction and Health Science career clusters have the highest number of priority occupations with 24 each, while Government and Public Administration and Science, Technology, Engineering, & Mathematics have the fewest with three each. The occupations selected include Electricians, Teachers, Pipefitters, and Steamfitters, Transportation Inspectors, Registered Nurses, Medical Assistants, and Industrial Engineers.

SOUTH CAROLINA GROSS DOMESTIC PRODUCT

South Carolina's economy has continued to expand over the past several years. **Exhibit 14** displays the state's Gross Domestic Product from 2020 to 2023 and the percent gain for each year. By 2023, South Carolina had a \$322 billion economy, which continues to have strong growth.

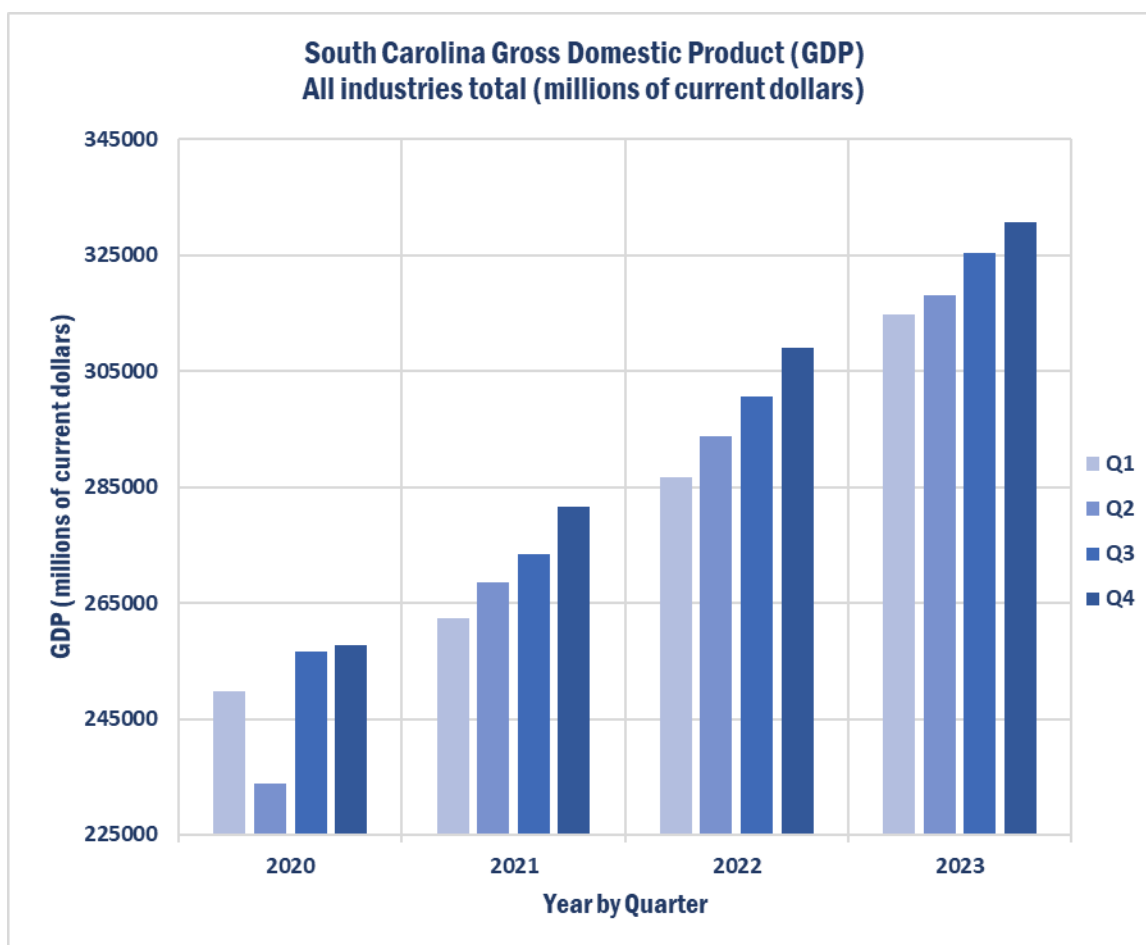

Exhibit 15 shows South Carolina's GDP in current dollars broken down by quarter from 2020-2023. The annotations show where S.C.'s economy had the highest GDP so far in Q4 2023 at \$330 billion and the lowest GDP for the period in Q2 2020 at \$227 billion. Note that the only decline in GDP was in Q2 of 2020 during the COVID-19 pandemic.

To show the underlying trends on a more detailed level, **Exhibit 16** presents the real gross domestic product on an industry basis. This is an inflation-adjusted measure that makes seeing a trend easier. The table shows an overall growth of 3.5 percent from 2022 to 2023. The top industry in 2023 was Finance, Insurance, and Real Estate at \$50,604 million, followed by Manufacturing at \$35,509 million. The Arts, Entertainment and Recreation industry showed the biggest increase in output from 2022 to 2023 at 11.7 percent. The Agriculture, Forestry, Fishing and Hunting industry had the most significant decrease in output from 2022 to 2023 at -115.7 percent, followed by Wholesale Trade at -1.9 percent and Nondurable Goods Manufacturing at -1.0 percent within the Manufacturing industry. Private industries grew by 3.8 percent.

FOREIGN TRADE

South Carolina has had a notable climb in its trade exports from 2021, rising by 26 percent, as shown in **Exhibit 17**. Transportation Equipment was 52.1 percent of the total value of exports in 2023, with Chemicals, then Plastics and Rubber Products following. All the top export industries were in Manufacturing, highlighting the sector's value to the state. Transportation Equipment has consistently been the top export industry for South Carolina; Transportation Equipment increases over the past years have accounted for the majority of South Carolina's increase in total trade exports.

Germany is the state's top export partner with \$4.7 billion dollars in trade in 2023. **Exhibit 18** shows that Canada, China, and Mexico are leading partners as well. Foreign exports increased over 23 percent from 2020-2023.

Singapore, as a state trade partner, had the largest percent change in the time period 2020-2023 at 284 percent, followed by Mexico at 67 percent, and Belgium at 41 percent. Over that period, the countries in the top 10 with a decrease in exports from the state are Japan at -13 percent, United Kingdom at -4 percent and China, for which the decrease was less than two-tenths of a percent.

PRIORITY POPULATIONS

South Carolina's citizens and workforce are very diverse. Different population groups often face varying challenges and barriers and may need more specific or dedicated services to meet their employment and training needs. The State Workforce Development Board (SWDB) focuses on several priority populations as described below.

Juvenile Offenders

In Fiscal Year (FY) 2021-2022, the S.C. Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) received over 13,000 youth referrals. During the 2022-2023 school year, SCDJJ School District graduated 111 students with nine high school diplomas, 101 high school equivalency diplomas, and one SC high school credential. In addition to relationships with several South Carolina colleges, a new post-secondary partnership was formed with Voorhees University and virtual instruction was provided for youth to pursue a four-year degree in Criminal Justice. These are among several programs geared toward helping young offenders make good choices for themselves.²

Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF)

For fiscal year 2022-2023, South Carolina had an average of 16,500 individuals receiving TANF benefits per month. This is the lowest level in the past five fiscal years. The number of jobs obtained by TANF employable recipients during the fiscal year was 1,130, down from the previous five fiscal years, following the declining trend of individuals receiving benefits.³ This group may have difficulty obtaining a family-sustaining wage. Even when they have jobs, the pay is often low. Training and employment support should be provided as this group may often lack the education and needed skills to get a better job.

Ex-Offenders

As of June 30, 2023, South Carolina had an inmate population of 15,997. For FY 2023 (July 1, 2022 – June 30, 2023), the S.C. Department of Corrections (SCDC) had 5,731 total releases from its base population. The average age of an inmate during this period was 41 years old. African Americans made up 58 percent of the total, with whites at 39 percent, and other races at three percent. The average sentence length is five years and four months. Fifty-five percent of inmates do not have a high school diploma or GED upon entering incarceration.⁴

In FY 2023, the Palmetto Unified School District (PUSD) awarded seven high school diplomas, 314 GEDs, 1,501 Vocational certificates, 396 WIN certificates, 3,174 on the job training certificates (OJT's), and two Department of Labor (DOL) Apprenticeship certifications. PUSD met their goals in three areas, high school diplomas, WIN certificates, and DOL Apprenticeships for FY 2022.⁵

People who have been imprisoned face several challenges re-entering society, not least of which is overcoming their past criminal history when seeking employment. Lack of education, poor computer skills, poor people skills, low self-esteem, substance abuse problems, and access to transportation are some problems that an ex-offender may face during the job search.

Veterans

According to the 2022 American Community Survey, South Carolina had 344,664 civilian veterans aged 18 or older, making up 8.4 percent of the state's civilian adult population. Veterans had a higher percentage of having some college education or an associate degree compared to the population aged 25 and older as a whole (37.9 percent for veterans, 30.1 percent for all). At 2.5 percent, veterans had a lower unemployment rate than the civilian population aged 18 to 64 (4.4 percent).⁶

Veterans may have to overcome stereotypes, such as employers thinking that all post 9/11-veterans have post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD). However, veterans have a great deal to contribute to any company. Many veterans have job skills that transfer directly to the civilian world, such as integrity, attention to detail, leadership, problem-solving, and a team-player mentality.

Disabled

Estimates from the American Community Survey in 2022 show that 14.5 percent of the state's civilian noninstitutionalized population was disabled.⁷ The disabled employed population in the workforce equaled 151,737 people aged 18 to 64 in 2022. Over 18,000 more people were unemployed, yielding a disabled unemployment rate of 10.7 percent. Cognitive difficulty was the top disability for both those employed and unemployed, while ambulatory difficulty was reported as the top disability for those not in the labor force.⁸ Therefore, this group will continue to need focused services to overcome these substantial barriers to employment.

Homeless

South Carolina's sheltered homelessness population was estimated at 4,053 people in 2023, up 12.3 percent from 2022, including 393 veterans, according to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. A total homeless rate of 8 per 10,000 people were experiencing sheltered homelessness. There are several strategies implemented to help individuals move from a homeless situation, including safe havens, rapid re-housing, and transitional housing programs.⁹

Long-term Unemployed

The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics considers someone unemployed for 27 weeks or more to be long-term unemployed. In 2023, South Carolina had 15,000 people in this category out of a total of 78,000 unemployed.¹⁰ DEW has several programs that can help this population regain employment.

Low Income

In 2022, South Carolina had an estimated 717,348 people living below the poverty level, or 14.0 percent of the population. Of this group, nearly 160,497 were employed, and 36,835 were unemployed.¹¹ Government assistance and educational support can help many of these individuals reach sustainable income levels.

Catawba

Catawba WDA had an occupational employment of 140,250 in 2023 with an average hourly wage of \$27.41 across all major occupational groups. **Exhibit 19** shows the highest average wage is in the Management Occupations group, with an hourly rate of \$61.52, followed by Computer and Mathematical Occupations with an hourly rate of \$48.43. The lowest average hourly rate is in the Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations with a rate of \$14.22, followed by Personal Care and Service Occupations with an hourly rate of \$15.99.
