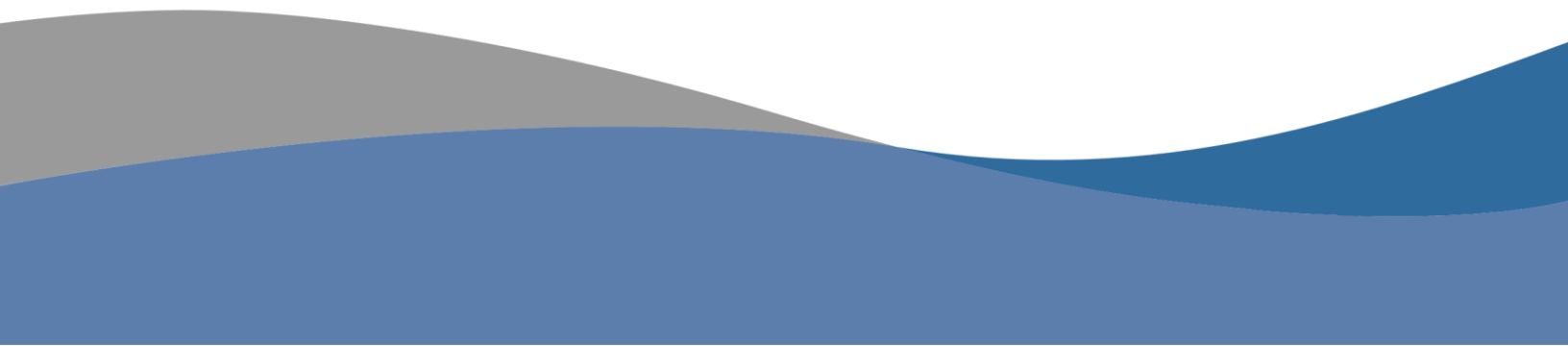




Economic Overview

Greenville



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Demographic Profile

The population in the Greenville was 537,575 per American Community Survey data for 2019-2023.

The region has a civilian labor force of 279,077 with a participation rate of 65.3%. Of individuals 25 to 64 in the Greenville, 41.9% have a bachelor's degree or higher which compares with 36.5% in the nation.

The median household income in the Greenville is \$74,624 and the median house value is \$273,900.

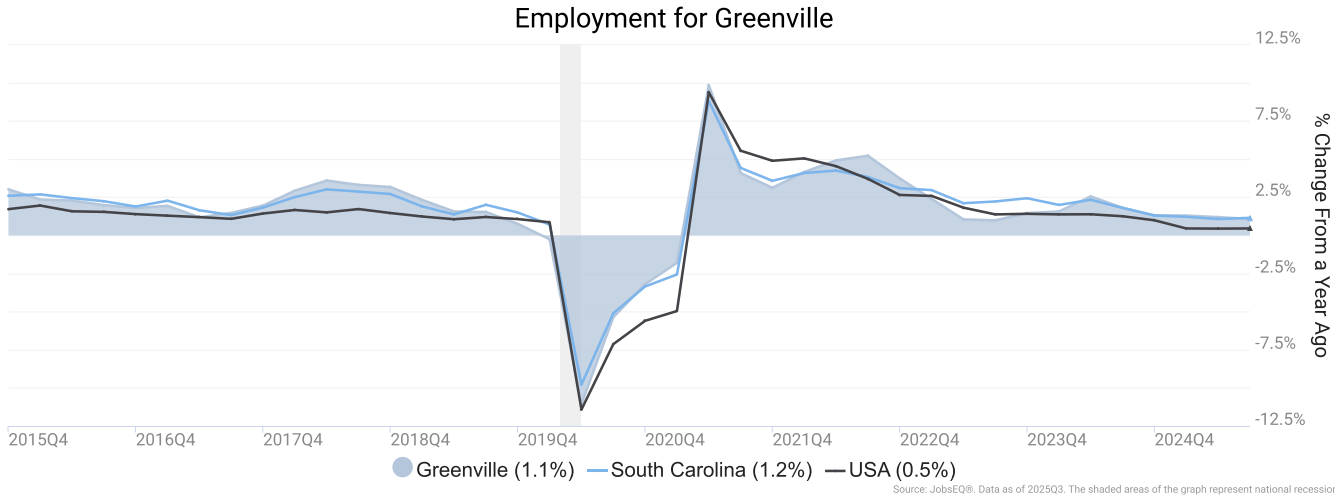

Employment Trends

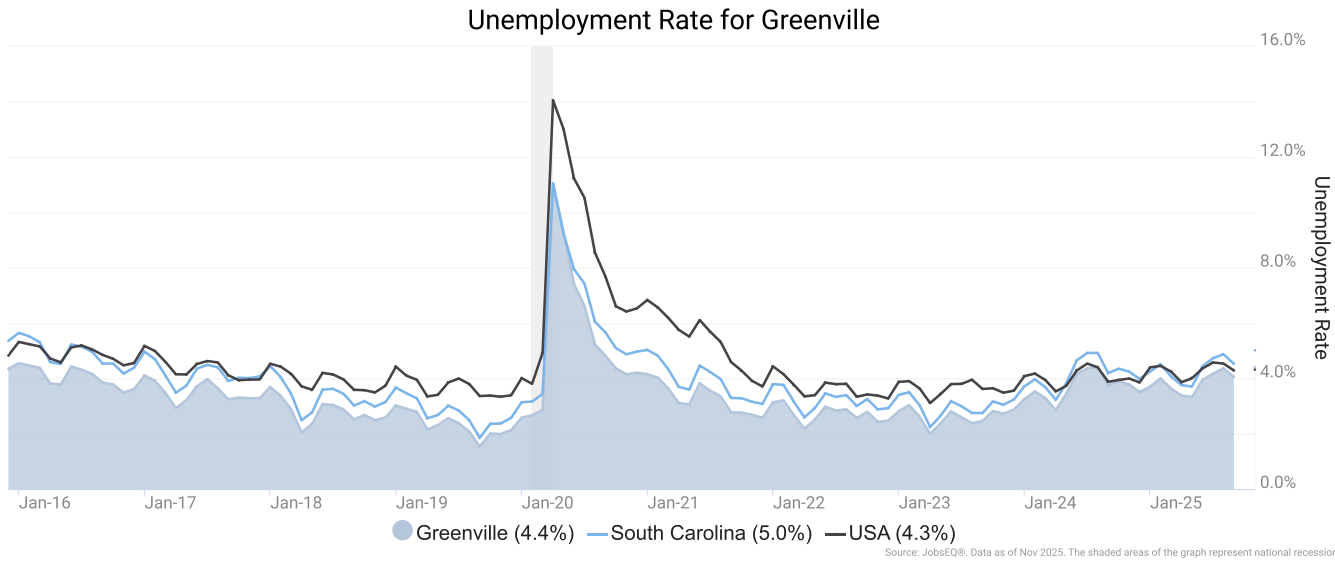
As of 2025Q3, total employment for the Greenville was 321,455 (based on a four-quarter moving average). Over the year ending 2025Q3, employment increased 1.1% in the region.



Employment data are derived from the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages, provided by the Bureau of Labor Statistics and imputed where necessary. Data are updated through 2025Q3 with preliminary estimates updated to 2025Q3.

Unemployment Rate

The unemployment rate for the Greenville was 4.4% as of November 2025. The regional unemployment rate was higher than the national rate of 4.3%. One year earlier, in November 2024, the unemployment rate in the Greenville was 3.8%.

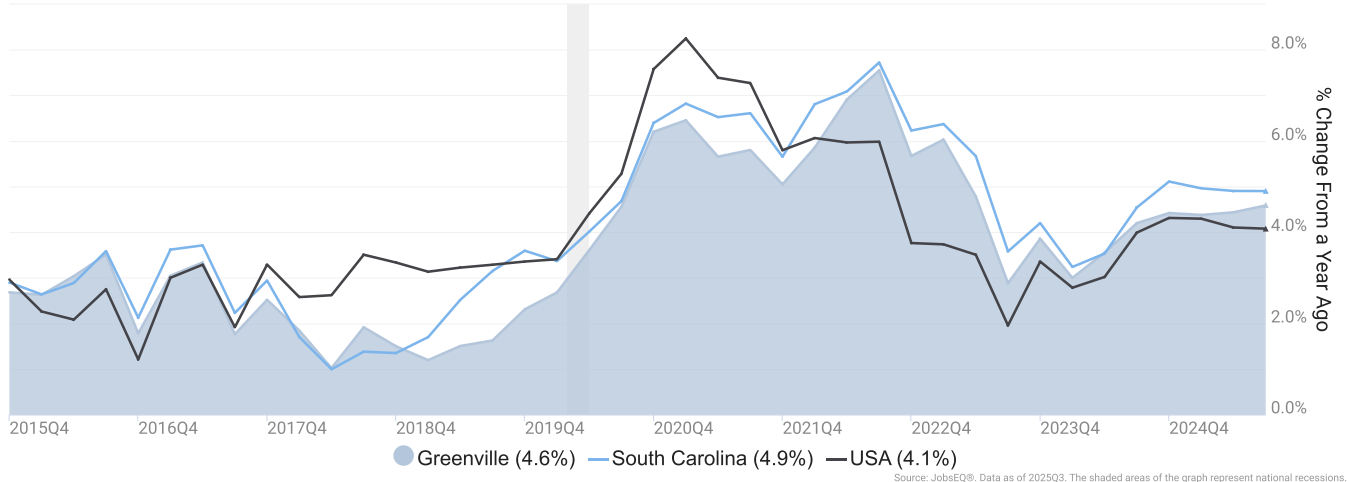

Wage Trends

The average worker in the Greenville earned annual wages of \$63,704 as of 2025Q3. Average annual wages per worker increased 4.6% in the region over the preceding four quarters. For comparison purposes, annual average wages were \$75,653 in the nation as of 2025Q3.

Cost of Living Index

The Cost of Living Index estimates the relative price levels for consumer goods and services. When applied to wages and salaries, the result is a measure of relative purchasing power. The cost of living is 7.2% lower in Greenville than the U.S. average.

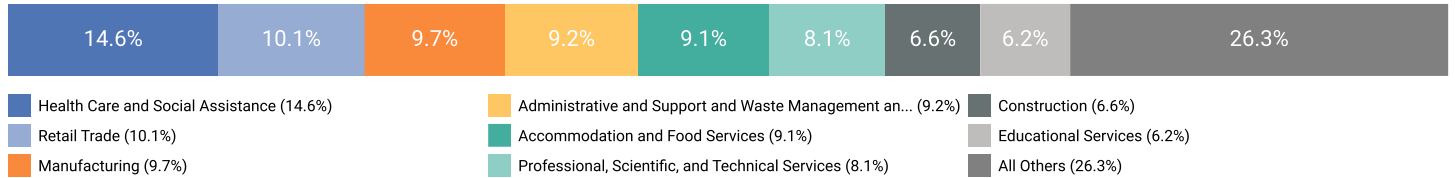

Industry Snapshot

The largest sector in the Greenville is Health Care and Social Assistance, employing 46,932 workers. The next-largest sectors in the region are Retail Trade (32,616 workers) and Manufacturing (31,277). High location quotients (LQs) indicate sectors in which a region has high concentrations of employment compared to the national average. The sectors with the largest LQs in the region are Administrative and Support and Waste Management and Remediation Services (LQ = 1.54), Manufacturing (1.25), and Management of Companies and Enterprises (1.17).

Sectors in the Greenville with the highest average wages per worker are Management of Companies and Enterprises (\$108,602), Mining, Quarrying, and Oil and Gas Extraction (\$107,354), and Finance and Insurance (\$102,784). Regional sectors with the best job growth (or most moderate job losses) over the last 5 years are Health Care and Social Assistance (+7,137 jobs), Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services (+6,444), and Accommodation and Food Services (+6,294).

Over the next 1 year, employment in the Greenville is projected to expand by 3,517 jobs. The fastest growing sector in the region is expected to be Health Care and Social Assistance with a +1.5% year-over-year rate of growth. The strongest forecast by number of jobs over this period is expected for Health Care and Social Assistance (+707 jobs), Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services (+354), and Accommodation and Food Services (+331).

Occupation Snapshot

The largest major occupation group in the Greenville is Office and Administrative Support Occupations, employing 40,793 workers. The next-largest occupation groups in the region are Sales and Related Occupations (31,407 workers) and Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations (27,844). High location quotients (LQs) indicate occupation groups in which a region has high concentrations of employment compared to the national average. The major groups with the largest LQs in the region are Architecture and Engineering Occupations (LQ = 1.40), Production Occupations (1.30), and Sales and Related Occupations (1.13).

Occupation groups in the Greenville with the highest average wages per worker are Management Occupations (\$133,200), Legal Occupations (\$106,400), and Healthcare Practitioners and Technical Occupations (\$106,300). The unemployment rate in the region varied among the major groups from 1.3% among Healthcare Practitioners and Technical Occupations to 8.4% among Farming, Fishing, and Forestry Occupations.

Over the next 1 year, the fastest growing occupation group in the Greenville is expected to be Healthcare Support Occupations with a +1.8% year-over-year rate of growth. The strongest forecast by number of jobs over this period is expected for Transportation and Material Moving Occupations (+316 jobs) and Healthcare Practitioners and Technical Occupations (+314). Over the same period, the highest separation demand (occupation demand due to retirements and workers moving from one occupation to another) is expected in Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations (5,350 jobs) and Office and Administrative Support Occupations (4,567).

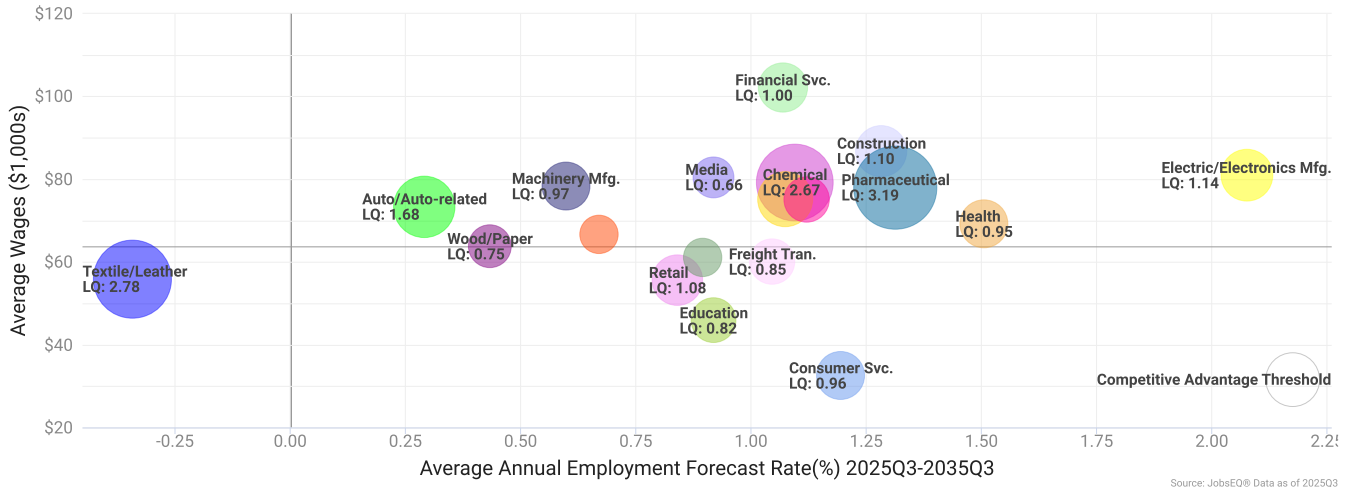

Occupation employment data are estimated via industry employment data and the estimated industry/occupation mix. Industry employment data are derived from the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages, provided by the Bureau of Labor Statistics and currently updated through 2025Q2, imputed where necessary with preliminary estimates updated to 2025Q3. Wages by occupation are as of 2025 provided by the BLS and imputed where necessary. Forecast employment growth uses national projections from the Bureau of Labor Statistics adapted for regional growth patterns.

Industry Clusters

A cluster is a geographic concentration of interrelated industries or occupations. The industry cluster in the Greenville with the highest relative concentration is Pharmaceutical with a location quotient of 3.19. This cluster employs 2,170 workers in the region with an average wage of \$78,006. Employment in the Pharmaceutical cluster is projected to expand in the region about 1.3% per year over the next ten years.

Industry Clusters for Greenville as of 2025Q3



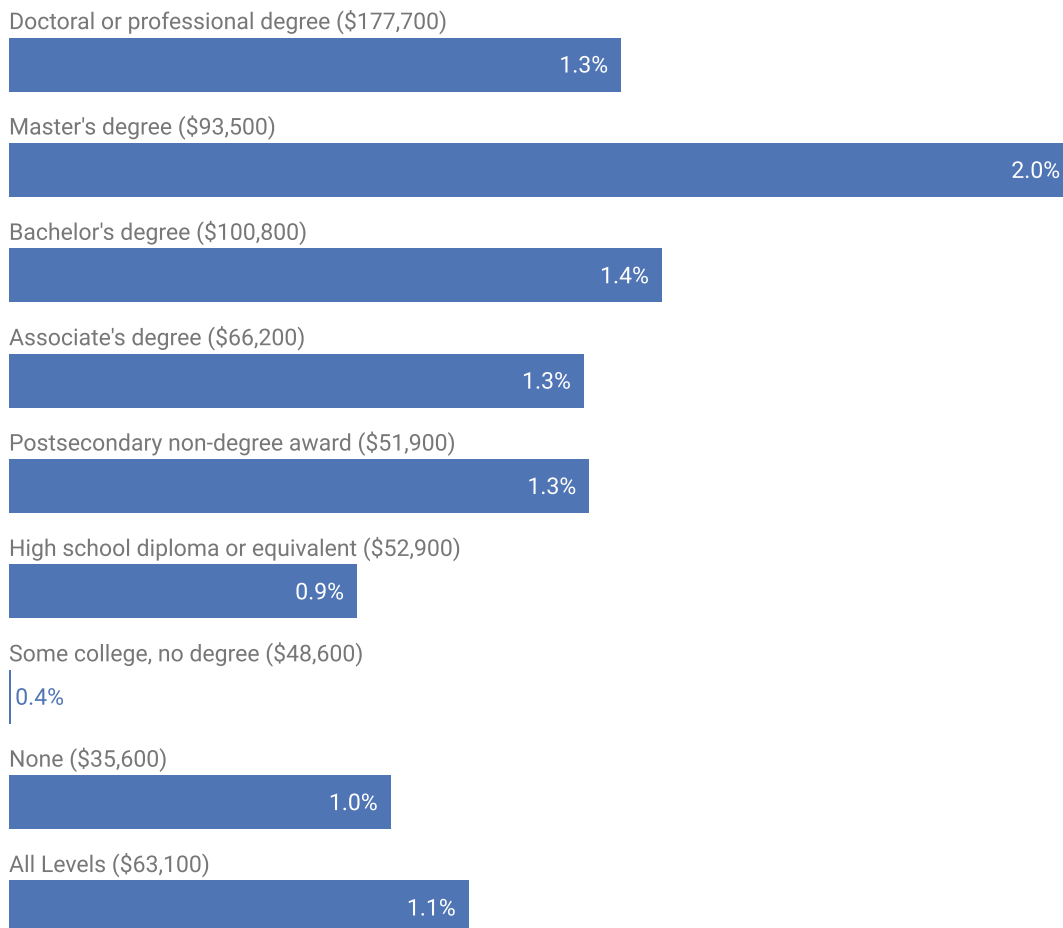

Education Levels

Expected growth rates for occupations vary by the education and training required. While all employment in the Greenville is projected to grow 1.1% over the next ten years, occupations typically requiring a postgraduate degree are expected to grow 1.3% per year, those requiring a bachelor's degree are forecast to grow 1.4% per year, and occupations typically needing a 2-year degree or certificate are expected to grow 1.3% per year.

Annual Average Projected Job Growth by Education Levels

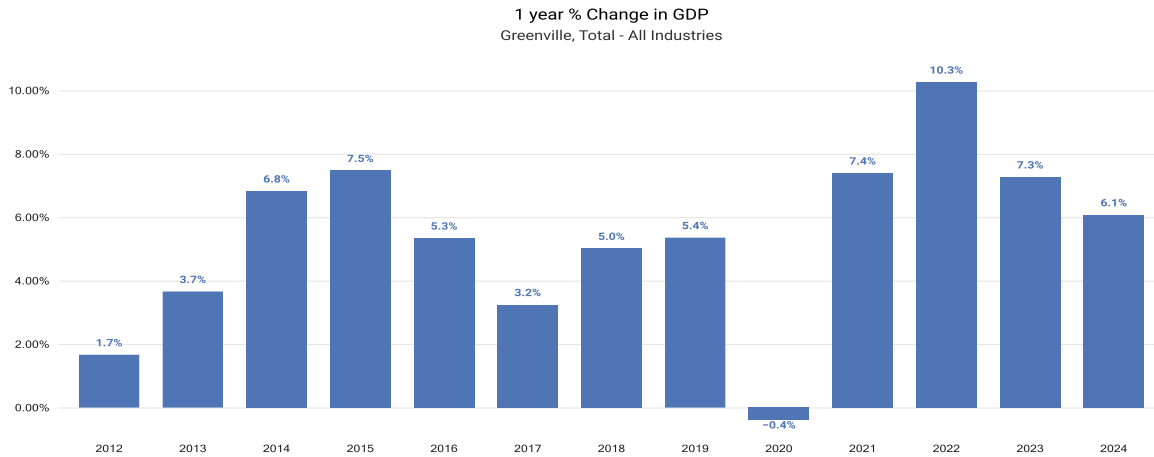

Gross Domestic Product

Gross Domestic Product (GDP) is the total value of goods and services produced by a region. In 2024, nominal GDP in the Greenville expanded 6.1%. This follows growth of 7.3% in 2023. As of 2024, total GDP in the Greenville was \$44,591,031,000.

Of the sectors in the Greenville, Real Estate and Rental and Leasing contributed the largest portion of GDP in 2024, \$6,825,376,000. The next-largest contributions came from Manufacturing (\$5,569,543,000); Health Care and Social Assistance (\$4,767,446,000); and Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services (\$3,689,373,000).

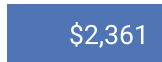

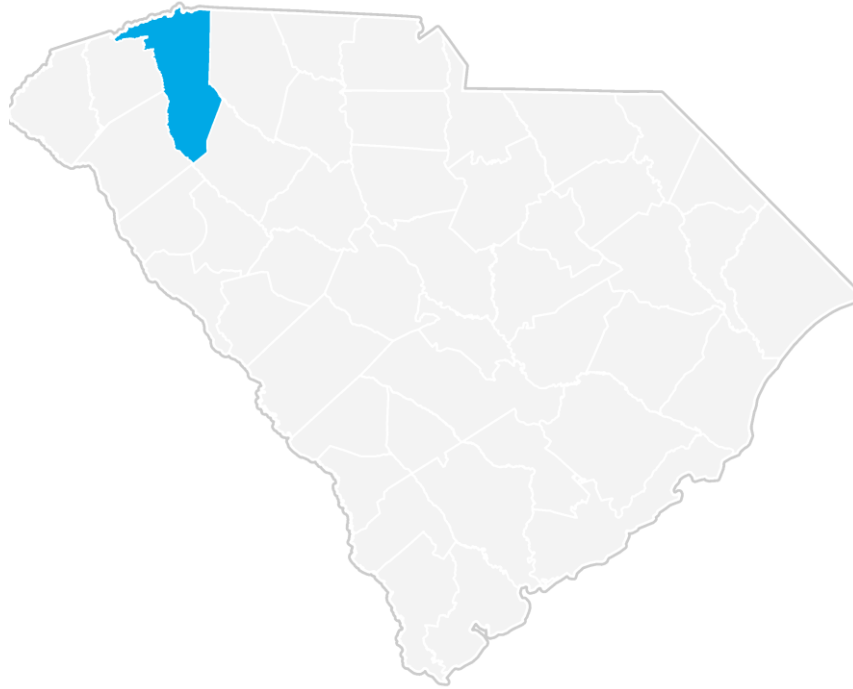

FAQ

What is a location quotient?

A location quotient (LQ) is a measurement of concentration in comparison to the nation. An LQ of 1.00 indicates a region has the same concentration of an industry (or occupation) as the nation. An LQ of 2.00 would mean the region has twice the expected employment compared to the nation and an LQ of 0.50 would mean the region has half the expected employment in comparison to the nation.

What is separation demand?

Separation demand is the number of jobs required due to separations—labor force exits (including retirements) and turnover resulting from workers moving from one occupation into another. Note that separation demand does not include all turnover—it does not include when workers stay in the same occupation but switch employers. The total projected demand for an occupation is the sum of the separation demand and the growth demand (which is the increase or decrease of jobs in an occupation expected due to expansion or contraction of the overall number of jobs in that occupation).

What is a cluster?

A cluster is a geographic concentration of interrelated industries or occupations. If a regional cluster has a location quotient of 1.25 or greater, the region is considered to possess a competitive advantage in that cluster.

What is the difference between industry wages and occupation wages?

Industry wages and occupation wages are estimated via separate data sets, often the time periods being reported do not align, and wages are defined slightly differently in the two systems (for example, certain bonuses are included in the industry wages but not the occupation wages). It is therefore common that estimates of the average industry wages and average occupation wages in a region do not match exactly.

What is NAICS?

The North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) is used to classify business establishments according to the type of economic activity. The NAICS Code comprises six levels, from the “all industry” level to the 6-digit level. The first two digits define the top level category, known as the “sector,” which is the level examined in this report.

What is SOC?

The Standard Occupational Classification system (SOC) is used to classify workers into occupational categories. All workers are classified into one of over 804 occupations according to their occupational definition. To facilitate classification, occupations are combined to form 22 major groups, 95 minor groups, and 452 occupation groups. Each occupation group includes detailed occupations requiring similar job duties, skills, education, or experience.
